Housing our Heroes

On Veterans Day – November 11th – our country honors the brave men and women who made tremendous sacrifices to protect our freedoms and keep our homes safe from harm. We proudly commemorate their dedication and loyal service with celebrations of gratitude across the country. Sadly, instead of marking this day with triumph, many Veterans will continue to fight their own personal battles right here on the streets —battles of homelessness and serious mental illness. On this Veteran's Day, however, many of the District's most vulnerable Veterans are able to unlock the door to their own homes thanks to Pathways to Housing DC.

In partnership with the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Pathways to Housing DC is currently moving 50 chronically homeless Veterans from living on the streets and shelters of Washington D.C. into permanent apartments of their own. We are also providing intensive wraparound support services necessary for them to be successful in connecting to the community and address issues that hinder their recovery. In our effort to help them make their new apartments into homes, we are still in need of move-in welcome baskets and household items. An update from Pathways DC's Executive Director

Christy's Corner This is a remarkable moment for Pathways DC. In 2004, we opened our doors in the Nation's Capital to end homelessness and support recovery for our most vulnerable neighbors. And that is exactly what we have

accomplished over the past eight years. Today, more than 450 formerly homeless individuals are part of the Pathways family, permanently residing in apartments throughout Washington, D.C. and receiving intensive support services from our

incredibly dedicated, community-based teams. Over the past few months, we have expanded our services and reach to serve even more individuals in need. We renovated our onsite clinic to better integrate our primary and behavioral health care services, expanded our community partner and landlord network and launched three novel, cutting-edge programs. Most significantly, we increased our work with chronically homeless Veterans and their families as part of a nationwide commitment, set by the Department of Veterans Affairs, to end Veterans' homelessness by 2015. In September we began managing the Urgent Care Clinic, one of the first of its kind, at the DC Superior Court. The clinic provides immediate behavioral health and addictions treatment to arrestees (over half of whom are homeless) and is funded through a partnership with the DC Department of Mental Health and APRA. What a phenomenal year thus far! I want to express my gratitude and appreciation to you, our supporters, for your commitment and generosity! It is because of you that our clients, who despite serious disabilities and histories of homelessness, are now living and thriving members of the Washington, D.C. community.
